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








Yet its history goes further back, as revealed by relics that include Roman tombs and an Ayyubid fortress. To this day, this fascinating place has retained its charm as a well-preserved historic town with beautiful narrow streets and dazzling old houses that echo mystical tales of splendor.










The Story of As-Salt

Every element of As-Salt has been woven into its story; from bustling streets and quaint staircases, to aromatic flavors and yellow stone exteriors that characterize the city. As-Salt is a distinctive destination because of the magical tale it tells, and for its unique ambiance that creates an enchanted town like no other.

The name 'As-Salt' comes from the Latin word **Saltus**, which means forest. Situated in the highlands of Al-Balqa region, the town is built in the crook of three hills close to the Jordan Valley. Since ancient times, including the Classical, Byzantine, Islamic and Ottoman periods, various communities settled in As-Salt. It was considered to be the first capital of Transjordan in 1921.

A city of many firsts, As-Salt was once one of the most important settlements in the area. Rich in history and agriculture, As-Salt was a fundamental trading link between the east and west banks of the Jordan River. The Romans, Byzantines and Mamlukes all contributed to the growth of the town, but it was during the end of the 19th and beginning of the 20th century that As-Salt enjoyed its most prosperous period. As the town flourished, many merchants arrived with their newly acquired wealth and built the fine houses that can still be admired today.

With its narrow lanes and exquisite late Ottoman architecture, As-Salt invites you to visit its markets and splendid traditional houses, tour the city on foot, and interact with its warm and welcoming people.

Historic Old Salt Museum, Abu Jaber House

history of the wider area of the Jordan Valley. You
can see traditional clothing on display, as well as
beautiful mosaics from churches in As-Salt.

Visit the ruins of the ancient Ayyubid castle, built in 1189 AD by King Issa bin Ayoub, Saladin's nephew. It was a 20-foot (6 meter) high rectangular building. The castle is situated in the middle of Ras Al-Amir hill in Al-Khandaq area.

Al Ain Plaza:

Take a stroll around Al Ain Plaza, originally a meeting point for traders in the city center, where many residents spend a few hours of their days discussing news, playing the traditional game of mangaleh, and oftentimes exchanging books. The plaza remains a point of gathering for cultural events. Al Ain translates to 'spring' in Arabic and the plaza is so-named because water from a nearby mountain spring used to pool here and locals came to collect their water from it.





The Great Mosque

This is the oldest mosque in As-Salt and the original building was constructed in the 13th century. The Ottomans rebuilt the mosque in the 1860s and then in 2007, what remained of the Ottoman structure was renovated and expanded into the new mosque you see today. The mosque represents the Islamic architecture, featuring interior vaulted spaces, a dome, and the use of stylized decorative arabesque patterns. At the entrance there are ablution corners. The second floor has an area for women to pray. The mosque was mentioned in the famous books of geographers and orientalists Johann Burckhardt and Citizens.

Admire the exterior of the Small Mosque, the oldest standing mosque in As-Salt, built through donations from the local community. The mosque is known for its exquisite minaret.


The Latin Church

Pass through or join a mass at the Latin Church, the first Catholic church in Jordan. It was designed by Italian priest and architect, John Moritan, who planned many churches in Palestine, and constructed in the 1880's. The church is famous for its high cross-vaulted ceilings, eight triple rounded columns, and Corinthian capitals carved in stone.

Al Khader Church

Light a candle and make a wish at Al Khader Orthodox Church, the most visited Christian faith site in As-Salt. Named after Al Khader (St. George), the church and the shrine within were originally built in an ancient cave in 1682. Many believe that miracles have happened at this church. Muslims are welcome to pray here too.

Roman Orthodox Church and School

Pass by this church and climb up its bell tower for an unmatched view of the city. The church is connected to a school, which is the first private school in As-Salt. It welcomes both Muslim and Christian students and teachers and promotes harmony and coexistence.

The English Complex

The English Complex was built over a period of four decades, in the middle of 19th century. It housed a group of buildings with several different purposes, including the first hospital in Jordan, a Protestant Church and a Sunday School. The complex courtyard offers beautiful views of the Abu Jaber Museum and the hills of As-Salt and you can enjoy a beverage at the café, which is run by the students of the Holy Land Institute for the Deaf.

The Harmony Trail

Best experienced with a local guide, get a feel of the interreligious harmony and coherence within the neighborhoods of As-Salt on the Harmony Trail. As-Salt is known for its sense of unity and community, which is reflected in the long-standing mosques and churches that peacefully stand side by side. While on the trail, keep an eye out for the Islamic and Christian symbols and inscriptions that are infused within the architecture of old homes and houses of worship.

Visit Prophet Yusha's shrine, located within a mosque to the west of As-Salt, on a hill that carries his name. Prophet Yusha' was the apprentice of Prophet Moses and later his successor.

Al Gherbal Restaurant







Travel Tips

- Be mindful of culture and traditions by dressing appropriately.
- When visiting religious sites, make sure to cover your shoulders and knees.
- Stand up and shake hands when meeting people.
- Conservative veiled women may choose not to reach out.
- Most shops and vendors do not accept credit card payments. You will need Jordanian dinars to make any purchases. There is a money exchange shop in the city center
- When shopping at local markets, make sure to haggle.
- English is not a widely spoken language in As-Salt. For seamless communication with locals, request a local guide to accompany you.
- During Muslim prayer time, don't interrupt or pass in front of someone praying in a mosque or a public place. Visitors must take off their shoes before entering the mosque and female visitors must wear a head cover.
- Alcohol is not served at local restaurants in downtown As-Salt.
- Don't be surprised if your host insists on overfeeding you during a meal. It is a symbol of Salti hospitality and generosity!
- Before taking photos of locals, be mindful of their privacy and ask for permission.
- Wear comfortable clothes and shoes for walking around As-Salt.
