

The Health & Safety Operating Guide for Oriental Antiques Shops

Establishments	Bazaars and oriental antiques shops selling traditional crafts, stone mosaic works, Dead Sea products and by-products, and touristic resorts operated by antiques shops
Operating Procedures	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Providing all employees and customers with hand-hygiene supplies, disinfection tools and tissues, as well as ensuring that they are available at all sales points. • No eating inside the facility. • Placing signs indicating the 2-meter safety distance at the entrance gates. • Providing disinfection material at both entry and exit points for tourists to use. • Any employee permitted to work must be in good health; subject to physician's approval. • Conducting a daily examination report for the staff which includes temperature measure and not showing symptoms such as sneezing and coughing. • If an employee is exposed to any disease, they are prevented from returning to work unless they prove they are free of any infectious or communicable disease and that they are Coronavirus-free, at the expense of the employer. • Limiting the use of banknotes in sales operations as much as possible and encouraging the use of electronic payment methods and developing them if possible. • Providing good natural ventilation in all rooms and facilities, if possible. • Requiring employees to wear personal protective equipment -such as masks- throughout the duration of their work time. • Maintaining the cleanliness of the site, especially door handles, handrails, etc... (find a scheduled mechanism to ensure continuous cleaning). • Disposing of waste several times per day, especially after employees have their meals in the break rooms. • Disinfecting all surfaces inside the shop periodically. • Periodic inspections are conducted by the specialized committees in coordination with the authorities entities. • Reassessing the work procedures based on the reports of the relevant committees and inspection visits. • Reporting any suspected case of Coronavirus to the Ministry of Health immediately; otherwise, an individual is at risk of penal accountability. • Conducting periodic PCR examinations for the employees.
